Content editing

Attention to big-picture aspects of your book

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Also called developmental editing or structural or substantive editing

Content editing

- Attention to big-picture aspects of your book
- Also called developmental editing or structural or substantive editing
- Varies in depth and detail; may include editorial letter and manuscript comments

Copy editing

Focus on clarity, correctness, and consistency

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- Includes checking spelling and grammar, as well as light fact-checking

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- Includes checking spelling and grammar, as well as light fact-checking
- The editor will likely create a style sheet as part of the edit

STYLE

- Use the serial comma; in general, author prefers lighter comma usage
- Ellipses style: single character (ex... ex)
- Dash style: spaced en dash (ex ex)
- Non-English languages: italicize first usage or if used only a few times; roman if term is in dictionary

CHARACTERS alphabetized by first name

Ben: taller than Birdie; deep brown eyes, brownish-black hair; traveling with his uncle, Noah Martin; from Marshall Falls, TX; parents are getting divorced

Birdie Blessing: 15 in book 1; American; brother Jonah died in a car crash along with her father; long chestnut hair, pale face, long legs, hazel eyes; from Bamburg, PA

TIMELINE

April 1499: Henri LeFort is threatened by a gang of teenagers in an obscure part of Bruges but manages to run away from them

summer solstice, June 21: Birdie and her mother arrive in Bruges and struggle to find their B&B

the next day: Birdie finds a stone on the roof of the B&B; they meet Harry and Helga, Ben, and Mrs. Devon at breakfast; Birdie and Ben realize there is something unusual about the stone Birdie found, though Mrs. Devon tells them it is just a toy aventurine

Line editing

Focus on style, polishing every sentence

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Some editors include it with copyediting; others consider it a separate or different service What's the difference between copyediting and line editing?

Proofreading

A final check to catch any remaining errors

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May include check of layout issues for print books

What does editing cost?

Compare rates

Does the rate include one pass or multiple revisions? How many?

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For hourly rates, can the editor provide a projected range?

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- Does the cost include extras like phone consultations or formatting?

Sign a contract

Does it include an estimate or project fee, schedule, + scope of work?

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Does it include an estimate or project fee, schedule, + scope of work?

- Does it address confidentiality + copyright for edits?
- Does it explain termination policies?
