


I asked my 91-year-old father, “Dad. What were your good old days?”

Who is this class for?



What Are Filter Words?

Filter words, also known as weasel or crutch words, are extra words, generally placed at the beginning of a sentence, most often with a pronoun.

Filter words tell the reader to look **at** the character, not **through** them. Filter words tend to make writing weaker.

Every filter word in your story reminds the reader they're **not** experiencing the story as the character does. That the story is just words on a page. It pushes the reader away from the character.

Following is a list of the usual villains. When you revise and edit, search for these words, and cut them if possible.

Filter Words in Your First Draft

While writing the first draft, go ahead and write filter words. At the beginning, when you try to edit them out while writing, you'll limit creativity. Just write. Deal with filter words after the first draft is finished.

And, as with most skills, practice improves **not** writing them. Working with filter words, rewriting sentences, and editing them out, the less filter words you'll have the next time you write. Your eyes will catch them as they'd catch a misspelling or other error.

Dropping filter words is a major part of writing in **deep point of view**. Deep point of view is the writer putting the reader in the characters shoes, letting them experience the drama, excitement, action, and everything as it occurs to the character.

Remember, these words usually follow a pronoun, she realized, he watched, he remembered, she saw, etc.

Try this and see if your writing isn't tighter and stronger.


