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



A Suspenseful Page-Turner

In The Basement, you are immediately sucked into Chloe's complicated world and ride with her as she struggles to navigate her way through a broken marriage, an affair lingering past its expiration date, the issues that arise when she ends both, and all the secrets that emerge during an emotional, intense argument with her husband in the basement.

I could only briefly stop reading when I neared the end because I had to set it aside due to anxiety over what Chloe was going to do next. Paxson's writing draws you in and keeps you moving until the end.


The Guild is planning now for events in 2023, including the 2023 Conference. We're searching for speakers and teachers in all areas of writing that have fresh content.





From the Book Shelf

Why I Practice Disaster Preparedness.

I attended a 'Disaster Preparedness' meeting a few years ago and it brought back the things I'd learned while living in foreign, third-world countries.

When I lived in Libya, water was stored in big water tanks, similar to those seen in some American towns. The tank that supplied water to our area used an electric pump to pull the water out of the ground and send it out to the users. If the electricity went out, so did the water. One of the first things I learned was to keep two five-gallon water cans or the equivalent in smaller containers always filled. Libya didn't treat the water, so we had to replenish the jugs often. I usually dumped mine in the washing machine each week.

When the wind blew hard enough to fill the air with dust, it was time to check the water jugs and begin filling the bathtub. Yes, toilets needed water to flush, too. After the wind began it wasn't long before the electricity went off, and right after that, the water dried up. Depending on the ferocity and length of the storm, we

could be without power and water for several days.

We had water covered. We also kept a full complement of propane and kerosene lanterns for nighttime activities. It was like camping out, but indoors. There was no danger from carbon monoxide with the lanterns or in the winter from the kerosene heaters because the windows and doors were the opposite of airtight. Gaps of sometimes an inch wide between the frames and the walls guaranteed an air exchange of heroic proportions.

Another disaster subject was the suggestion of keeping enough non-perishable food on hand to last a family for an adequate length of time.

Occidental Petroleum, in Libya, recommended we keep at least two weeks of food on hand—minimum.

The Libyan government vacillated between which country it hated at any one time. Sometimes it was the French, the German, or the British. And of course, many times it was the Americans.

"Spontaneous demonstrations" would occur demanding whatever from whichever country they were castigating at the time. (The demonstrators had identical signs professionally printed, and the government conveniently bussed the participants to the starting point after conscripting them out of various area businesses and offices.) Yep, spontaneous.

When it was America's turn in the barrel, the Sullivan family, who had the only phone in our neighborhood, would get a call. They would spread the word to lower what we called, the Ghiblis, metal shutters that rolled down and locked to cover the windows and the French doors, and we were to stay home until further notice.

Everyone had water, food, and lanterns. We were good to go.

When the "all clear" came, someone in the neighborhood would throw a humdinger of a party. It was fun, sort of. Penny Clark

What's Needed for a Plot

- 1. **Situation,** inciting incident forces the protagonist into action.
- 2. **Protagonist**, Affected by incident creating a goal that drives the story.
- 3. **Objective** is the goal or what the character wants.
- 4. **Opponent**, the antagonist who tries to stop the protagonist from reaching their goal.
- 5. **Climax,** it should be intense, dangerous, and a serious showdown.
- 6. **Resolution,** where sub-plots and everything else is neatly tied up.

5 Mistakes that will give you negative reviews

1. Topographical and grammatical errors

Spelling and punctuation errors are the biggest red flags there are. You should plan on letting a **professional editor** and/or proofreader correct it before publishing.

Don't publish a novel too soon —it's not finished until you are sure the majority of errors have been found and removed.

2. Chest beating

Don't brag on your writing. Don't say it — write it and prove it true. A little humility goes a long way.

3. Not understanding genre expectations

Before you try to write a historical mystery, ecological thriller, or steampunk romance, you need to understand the genre. Have you read more than a few books in your chosen genre? Are you aware of what storylines are trending? Do you know what the reader expects in that genre?

The more you explore the works in the genre you intend to write in, the stronger your work will be.

4. Amateurish cover art

People **do** judge a book by its cover. The cover is the first thing a buyer sees. It's a big deal and is worth the money to get a professional cover made. Amateurish or ill-conceived cover art won't do your book or sales any good.

5. No social networking presence

If you're a self-published author, it is imperative that you have a social media presence. If you don't have a website or you're not active on Facebook, Twitter, Goodreads, etc., you're fighting an uphill battle. (And your right there with me.) Editor.


