Loy asked for ideas of how to make the September conference better. Ideas for recording the speakers, speaker subjects, and several more were discussed.

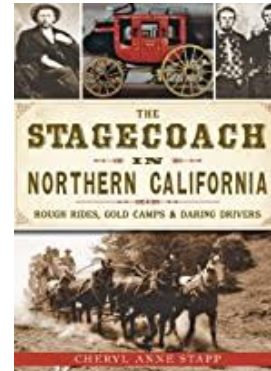
Barbara let us know that the Galt Library presents a speaker on writing each Saturday.

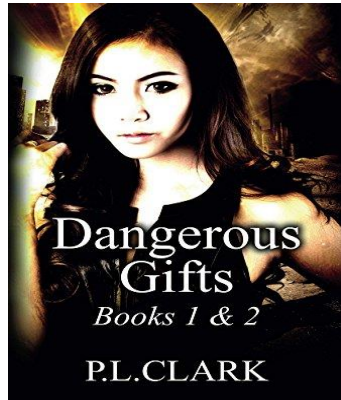

hardships of this era may cause me to skip a visit.

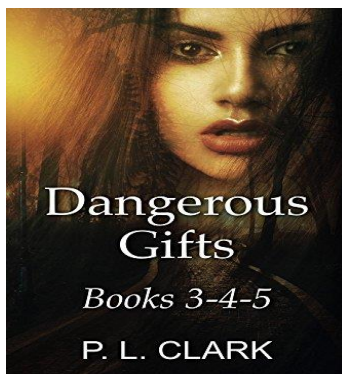

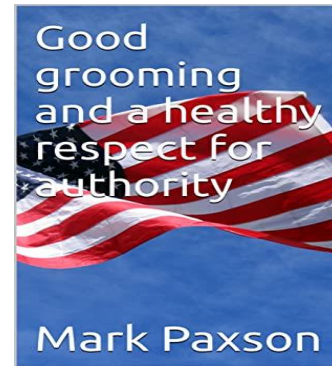

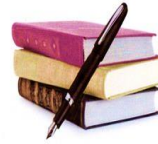

A Reminder

Tautology

A tautology is saying the same thing twice using different words, meaning you can cut one of the words.

Examples include phrases like “evening sunset” or “autobiography of her life.” In these examples “evening” and “of her life” mean the same thing as “sunset” and “autobiography” you don't need both.

A Problem the Editor Owns

Run-on Sentences

Comma splices consists of two independent clauses fused together with a comma.

To fix them either insert a coordination conjunction, separate them into two separate sentences with a period, or use a semi-colon. An example 1. “Penny is cold, she wants to go inside” to fix it, “Penny is cold. She wants to go inside.” 2. “Jim woke late, he missed his bus” fix it as “Jim woke late, and he missed his bus.”
