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


If anyone knows a good place that's quiet, let Loy know.

The first of the Tau Ceti Science Fiction series by George T. Hahn



Pitcairn has no faster-than-light travel, and sending and receiving messages and goods takes almost twenty-five years. Then Earth sends robots to help with their daily activities. The robots have instructions from Earth to build a new communication device that would allow for faster transmission of information between the two planets. This event sparks suspicion among the colonists It was an enjoyable read as it had a unique style of writing. The book explores the complexities of human nature, the importance of communication, and the impact of isolation on the psyche. The book captivates the reader with its words and characters.

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

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Writing Tidbits

10 Signs of Underdeveloped Characters

- Flat dialogue. Dialogue won't sound real unless the reader can relate to the character.
- **2. Melodrama.** Exaggerated gestures, speech and emotions is a good sign the writer doesn't know how his character would act or react.
- Lack of emotion. Everyone and every character feels emotions. A character who feels nothing needs to be more developed. Even the coldest of killers feels emotion.
- 4. Passive Voice. (Especially in first person POV.) Passive voice comes across as flat and reflects the character's personality as flat.
- 5. Long Interior Monologues.

 Monologues that go on for more than a paragraph usually ramble and become flat.
- 6. **Feeling of Omniscience.** Have you pushed your readers away from the character? Are they watching instead of being engaged in what's happening? Develop your character.
- 7. **Repetitive and Redundancy**. This can happen in passive sentences. If you resay things in different words, that points to a less than three-dimensional character.
- 8. Lack of Relatable Characteristics. Your character must act like a human for a reader to be able to relate and care about them.

- 9. Staccato Scene Changes. Abrupt scene changes, especially involving a character, breaks up the natural flow of the story and makes the reader stop reading. It's an indication your character is a pawn rather than a real player in the scene.
- 10. Lack of Desire or Fear. This is related to number 3. People's desires and fears motivate them to take some sort of action. That action might be a bit of dialogue to lead the story toward the goal.

If one of your characters is weak or isn't doing what he/she should, find a character sheet online and fill it out.

Learn who they are and how they'll react under duress, what would make them angry, happy, lustful, or any other emotion featured in your story.
