

Three blogs on Al use for authors and more, are listed on top of page 10.



From the Bookshelf

REPRIEVE B. Barrett

I heard the low murmurs and laughter of the nurses in the hallway and knew I was alive. I had survived the open-heart surgery. There was no sense of elation or joy. It was simply a statement of fact mixed with surprise.

It was a painful awakening. The tube in my throat hurt and I was really thirsty. My mouth was so dry, my lips felt cracked. My teeth and tongue were stuck together. I wanted to beg for water. However, I couldn't talk because of the air hose. I fell asleep again, thank goodness. When I awoke, I tried to communicate my thirst, but the nurses couldn't understand my "sign" language. Finally, I wrote WATER backwards in the air and was told I couldn't have any. When I wrote ICE, the nurse shook her head. By now my lips and mouth were excruciatingly painful.

This was my third open-heart surgery. The attempt to replace the mitral and aortic valves six months before had been unsuccessful. At that time, another cardio surgeon found so much calcium, he couldn't remove it all.

He took a stitch in my mitral valve and closed me up. I was in the hospital for a week and sent home. Twelve days later I was in Emergency with Congestive Heart Failure. Because of the stitch, the blood flow in the mitral valve was so restricted it was impacting my breathing. The only way to repair it was another surgery open-heart and the cardiovascular surgeon who had performed the operation said I would never survive another one. I was given Furisomide and Metoprolol. By this time, my breathing was so bad, I had to rest after only walking six feet and I couldn't say a complete sentence without stopping to take a breath.

Since there was nothing more my primary care doctor and cardiologist could do, I was put on Home Health Care and again I was sent home. This time to die. When I asked the Home Health nurse how that would happen, She said I would go to sleep and simply stop breathing.

I started having nightmares. I woke up standing next to my bed, trying to feel my way in the dark, not knowing where I was or if I was alive or dead. That question was the worst part. Although I'm a spiritual person, I had no idea what to expect. How do we define death? Was it the impenetrable darkness in my nightmares or a bright light with all my relatives and friends who have already passed over? Or perhaps, an extension of my previous life only at a lower energy level – sort of going from technicolor to black and white or even vice versa? After a couple of weeks of nightmares, I started to sleep with a night light. Once there was light in my room, I could see the familiar surroundings and that helped stop the uncertainty.

During my three-month checkup, I again asked the surgeon for another operation. I was willing to take the risk, but he refused stating there was a 98 percent chance I would die on the operating table. I knew there was no hope from that doctor, so I asked for a second opinion and was given the name of a top cardiovascular surgeon in the Bay Area about two hours away. During the five weeks I waited for an appointment, I prepared for death. By now I was only sleeping about an hour or two each night. My skin itched incessantly and the involuntary muscle jerks in my legs made relaxation impossible. The only thing that helped was baths. The relief was temporary so some days I took two or three a day trying to relax those muscles and soothe my skin. It helped for a short while. They were wonderful. I used Epsom salts, a soothing mixture called Tired Old Ass Soak and another one for deep relaxation. My bathtub is small, and I often fell asleep for an hour or so until the water cooled.

I told myself over and over that things will work out as they should. I trusted in Love. I never thought about living. I was too busy just surviving each day and night.

My sister drove me to the Bay Area for my first appointment with Dr. Vincent Gaudiani in Mountain View.

We arrived at his office and had to wait. He was delayed in surgery. I sat in the office trying not to get my hopes up. I was so scared he wouldn't operate. When the doctor finally walked in, I'll never forget his words. "I'm going to do the operation because if I don't, you'll die. But it's a difficult and dangerous one. Are you sure you want to go through with it?"

The relief that he would operate was so intense, I could only nod. If I had been able to breathe better, I would have gotten up and danced. I signed more papers so all my medical records could be sent to him. His nurse made another appointment for me in a month. Those thirty days seemed endless. By that time, I could only speak about four or five words without taking a breath.

During my next appointment Dr. Gaudiani asked if I had changed my mind. I hadn't. He told me I was a very courageous person. I couldn't relate to that. To me there simply was no alternative. I knew without the surgery, I would die within a few weeks. At least this way, I had a chance. It had been five months since the prior operation. The doctor wanted me to wait another month to give the scar from my last surgery more time to heal so it was scheduled for the end of April.

Another four weeks. I was given the doctor's private cell phone number in case my body couldn't wait that long. By the time I checked into the hospital, I could barely say two words without taking a breath and even walking a few steps was difficult.

As you know from the first sentence, I survived. But that is only half my story.

There are many books and articles about preparing to die, but not many that talk about life after survival - when you've been given a reprieve. Yes, there is much written about second chances but all that seemed meaningless to me. There was, of course, a long period of physical therapy to strengthen my body and breathing improve my and Ι concentrated on that. It took quite a while to be able to focus my mind again, but that improved as the medications were eliminated. But, underneath all this activity, I felt haunted. It was as if some part of me was missing. Like I'd left part of myself behind. Death had been waiting for me and I had somehow missed the appointment, that only half of me had crossed over. I felt like Bruce Willis in The Sixth Sense. He had died and didn't know it. Can you feel depressed because you didn't die?

The questions about death changed into those about life. This was a "new" opportunity. Was there for a special purpose I survived that operation? Over and over, I asked this question, but nothing came to me, or maybe it was so subtle I didn't recognize it.

I went through all the motions of living. I laughed frequently and after almost 15 months, I even began to write

and edit my poetry and short stories. I was feeling stronger and braver.

To test this, I decided to start with the night light I still used to keep the darkness away. Before I went to bed that night, I shut it off. I felt a little uneasy but managed to sleep okay. Although I didn't use it for several more nights with no reaction at all, I decided to turn it back on. Not because I needed to ward off the darkness. It was a choice, not a necessity. In the dim light I could straighten my blankets when they got tangled, plump up my flattened pillows bathroom and use the without stumbling. Sounds like a rationalization. Maybe it was.

Even months after the operation, I felt vulnerable. I knew there was a difference between the person I was before the anesthesia and this person who survived. But who am I now? I had so many questions. The biggest one? Why did I survive?

A little over five years later, I still hadn't found any answers. Death was still the Big Unknown. Then in November 2022, I passed out at a luncheon and was taken to Emergency. Again, I was told I urgently needed another open-heart surgery to repair my mitral valve.

When I got the news this second time, I remembered these words by Dylan Thomas:

Do not go gentle into that good night, Old age should burn and rave at close of day; Rage, rage against the dying of the light.

However, I didn't feel any burning, raving or raging inside. Just Fear. Yes, my old nemesis was back, and I knew facing Fear is the only way to overcome it.

For decades I've believed life has to have quality, not just quantity. I could see myself lying in a hospital bed, connected to an oxygen tank, and staring at a white ceiling all day. Nope. Nope. Nope.

I made the choice to live out my natural length of time, whatever that is.

Five months later when I went to my new cardiologist, she ran more tests. Unexpectedly, they showed no further deterioration in my heart condition. It was still the same as it was in 2021. The tests in November had reflected the extreme stress I was under. Now, I lived a more relaxed and balanced life.

Again, I was reprieved. This was the second time. While I was relieved to know my life was going to be longer than I thought, I saw very clearly that for me, there are things much scarier than death.


