More About Dialogue

Dialogue's Purpose

The four purposes of dialogue are:

- 1. It can heighten the emotional stakes (goals) and increase conflict and tension, which are two necessary parts of a well-plotted novel.
- 2. Dialogue advances the plot and drives the story forward. It can set up future scenes.
- 3. It can provide brief bits of backstory. Remember to keep it as short as possible.
- 4. Dialogue helps to develop the character of the speaker.

This month, instead of From the Bookshelf, Several of us are presenting memories of Barbara Barrett.

Barbara Barret, My Memories of You

We first met at the Elk Grove Senior Center Writers Group on Sharkey Way. I was younger, and so were you, dear Barbara. I first noticed your tiny frame as you took your place at the table. Next, I noticed your bright, intelligent eyes and hair color, like spun red gold, as you read your poem.

It rhymed perfectly as it told a vivid story set in an ancient time about the abuse and revenge of beautiful women. Was that woman you, Barbara? I never got the courage to ask.

A subsequent Sr. Center meeting haunts me still today. We'd had our infamous "birthday" potluck that day. When the meeting was over, people were filing out, but you stopped and gazed up at me with a tear in your eye. You said, "This was a wonderful meeting. Thank you for what you're doing here."

In 2018, you were excited about the Guild's first Writers Conference. When we formed the non-profit, you became a member very soon. You really liked Jim, too. During our events, you always made it a point to tell him the latest about your favorite football player,

Aaron Rodgers. Later, you'd tell me he was a "Keeper."

Time passed, and sadly, your health started to decline. Wearing an oxygen tube and packing the tank, you fought each day, determined to "carry on." You continued to pay for every event, knowing you might not be able to come. I'd offer you a refund, but you always said no. You wanted to support me and the Guild.

I have good memories of all the times you critiqued my work. Those great suggestions will always reside in the pages of Cat & Mouse and will be published soon.

Through it all, you always attended the Sr. Center and Guild meetings when you could. Recently, you came into the Guild meeting at Round Table with the oxygen. But as the minutes of that meeting rolled by, I noticed your determined smile, yet your eyes and poor breathing were a dead giveaway to the depth of your suffering.

Our last time together was both joyful and scary. It was a Brie and Tea party you hosted. I was so happy to be with you despite noticing your frail condition had worsened. As you struggled to breathe, the oxygen seemed useless. In spite of this, you were determined to feed and visit with us. When it was time to go, we hugged, said our goodbyes, and vowed to do it again soon.

Too much time passed before I sent you that last email. By evening, no response. With a bad feeling deep in

my gut, I called for a welfare check on you, and the officer gave me the bad news.

Today, I know you aren't suffering and need no more oxygen. You're up there in heaven, smiling at us, free to write and cheer us on no matter how hard life gets. Love always, Loy Holder

For My Friend - Barbara B.

In the acknowledgment section of my last book, *Vanished*, concerning the people who critiqued my book, I wrote, "Barbara—Oh my gosh! What would I do without you?"

As of October 6th, I'll struggle to find out. My Barbara, Barbara Barrett, has gone where extraordinary writers and poets go when they leave this mortal plane. I'm sure she's there, correcting other's works, writing poetry, and retelling her tales to eager listeners. I hope she's also watching me, jabbing at me when I need to check my writing.

I don't remember exactly when I first met Barbara, but it was somewhere between 2014 and 2017 at the Elk Grove Senior Center's writing group. Our eyes met when I entered the room, and we smiled at each other. At that moment, I sensed she was someone who would become special to me.

I was right.

From the time I met her, she read and critiqued most of the books I wrote. Her suggestions were spot on, and I learned about repetition and redundancy through her constant reminders. I was so proud when several chapters were returned to me with neither of those R-words in the comments section. Eventually, as I wrote, my mind poked me, and Barbara's voice would say, "Redundant," or "You've already said that," and I'd silently thank her as I corrected the offense.

She freely contributed over thirty pieces of her poetry for the newsletter and would occasionally ask if I needed more.

When my stash runs out (too soon), the Poetry Corner might become silent. What a shame.

Barbara was not only a writer and poet but also a person who lived a full and adventurous life and did things most people only dreamed of. I loved hearing her tale of using her writing abilities in exchange for spending time in a total submersion pod.

As people grow older, they forget which memories they've already recounted, and Barbara was no different. But I could sit and listen to

her memories for hours, grinning with her as she spoke.

The last thing she emailed me after I finished *Vanished* was to tell me not to wait too long before starting the next book because she enjoyed reading my stories.

That was high praise, and it still warms my heart.

I'll miss you, Barbara, but I'll catch up with you later. Penny Clark

Memories of Barbara Barrett

A knot tightened in my stomach when I learned my talented writer friend, Barbara Barrett, had transitioned to another plane of existence.

Flashes of Barbara stories and Barbara-isms produced precious memories of shared phone calls at midnight, straightforward email critiques, and her periodic "Tea and Brie" parties with cheese, crackers, fresh fruit, and Seasoned Girl Talk. We reminisced at her summer 2024 gettogether about the first time we all met at the Elk Grove Senior Center in 2018 after I self-published my amateurish first book the prior year.

Diminutive Barbara had reddishbrown hair and an impish girlish grin. But make no mistake, she was no wallflower. She took no prisoners. Her prose and poems packed a wallop, and she freely shared her expert critiques with those of us trying to step up the ladder of literary success.

I thought fondly about the yin and yang feedback Barbara gave me about my nonfiction genealogy manuscripts. I'll always treasure her motivating critique of my *Finding Marshalls* book, which she almost finished in five hours one night. She emailed, "You are especially good at describing your cousins and the various people you encountered on your trip,



as well as the synchronicity of the events that happened. I felt I knew the people and was right there in the car and wherever you went on your trip. I wanted to know more about your search and your family. Most of all, I feel I got to know you better, and that's

a privilege when given to another person." She included quite a few suggestions for improvement but always balanced the tough love with just enough atta-girl compliments to balance her you-need-to-change-this advice.

Barbara also critiqued the wacky fiction short stories I submitted to various writing competitions and anthologies. While supportive of my work, Barbara did not mince words when suggesting improvements. I appreciated her candor. That's how we grow as authors. She had a knack for seeing the perfect opening sentence to hook the reader. Then, she would propose an ending that wrapped the reader in a warm blanket, encouraging them to seek out more of my stories.

She wrote, "I enjoyed your article, *The Highs, and Lows of Being a Self-Published Author*. I admire you not only for your hard work as a researcher, writer, and self-publisher but also because of the information and inspiration you give to others who attend your lectures. Seven books in five years is amazing, Shero."

Barbara knew just how to pick me up when I felt berated by someone I admired. She wrote, "Kathy, to give yourself some distance and objectivity, picture yourself surrounded by a white light. Start at a point about six inches below your feet and bring the white light upward all around you to a point about six inches above your head. It helps you see so clearly. I'm sending lots of love

to you."
What a doll!

And my girl,
Barbara, shared some of her triumphs with me, too. "Kathy, I had to



share this with you. My first published book, Tomboy Fun, won the Silver Award from the Northern California Publishers and Authors organization. There were no other winners in that category, although there were about eight or nine entrants. All the judges loved it, and that makes me so happy!"

It is beyond difficult knowing that our talented friend is physically gone from our lives. But I had an unbelievable, other-worldly experience that suggests Barbara will forever be with us.

Around 9:30 AM on October 20th, I drove my Voter's Ballot to a nearby Drop-off Box. I needed to buy some spinach for a dinner party I'd be

giving that night, so I walked to the next-door Bel Air grocery store—a store I hadn't set foot in for twenty years. Imagine my shock when someone began calling my name from across the store. What? It couldn't be. I walked briskly toward the strawberryblond woman who hailed me. It was Loy Holder, head of our Monday Writer's Critique group, and her husband. Loy is the one who contacted me the previous day with news of Barbara's death. After a few hugs and tears, a thought hit me like a brick. I choose to believe that this timely meeting had to be Barbara at work! She always said she was a spiritual person. And now, she *is* the spirit.

Barbara wants her story told, so we intend to ensure she is not forgotten in the way we know best: through writing.

Thanks for the beautiful memories, dear friend. Rest in Prestige. Kathy Lynne Marshall

More Writing Tips

Shrug, Nod, Smile, and Reach are common words sometimes overused by authors.

While that doesn't make them bad, you want to be sure there isn't a more accurate, succinct, or specific way to describe the action.

Sometimes, a smile is just a smile, but if you're using the word too often, you need a better way of saying it.

Example: instead of, "She smiled as he walked through the door," use, 'She beamed with excitement when she caught sight of him."

CONFESSION OF A BLACK SHEEP WRITER

Elaine Faber

Other writers may outline, synopsize, write 6-page characterization charts for each character, and draw a detailed family history and backstory. They may summarize every scene before they put pinkie to paper. I'm the black sheep writer. I throw out all those conventional rules, write by the Grace of God, a vivid imagination, and trust the characters to tell their own story.

THINGS TO CONSIDER before I begin.

Is the main character male or female, animal or human? I have a general idea for a story arc, set the protagonist's goal, and select a timeframe and setting. Determine if a character is serious (nahh!), snarky, or funny (that works). How about a sidekick? Who and how many POV characters are there? (One to four) What is the major complication to reaching the said goal? Example – **Mrs.** Odboddy and the Conniving Candidate: Set during WWII in No. CA, Mrs. Odboddy, runs for city council, and her unworthy opponent is doing his level best to complicate her life. Her sidekick is her granddaughter, Katherine, who does the hair and make-up at Whistlemeyer's Mortuary.

HOOK THE READER In the first chapter, jump straight to an inciting incident (action, disaster, problem, or crisis). In chapter one, someone enters Mrs. Odboddy's home and disconnects the kitchen pipes, flooding her house. In addition to an intriguing story concept, the protagonist must exceed the

reader's expectations: unselfish and brave. I must convince the reader to admire my character enough to want to accompany her on this quest or journey.


CRISES ERUPT Once the requirements listed above are firmly in my head, the characters begin to tell their own story from beginning to end. Subplots emerge, and crises erupt. If I get writer's block, I ask, "What is the WORST thing that can happen right now?" And that's what happens. At the end of each chapter, the POV character faces either a small crisis or a question. With a 2-character POV format, switch to the other POV character in the next chapter. This keeps the reader turning pages. There should be an over-arching issue encompassing the whole story, but always end chapter with small inciting a event/statement.

EDITING Edit, edit! Consider the first draft carefully. I may change the events in a scene, move it to another location, change the POV character in the scene, or even remove paragraphs and sentences while adding others. Improvement comes with editing and tightening.

TYING UP THE LOOSE ENDS. About 3/4 of the way toward my desired word count, I'll begin to tie up the loose ends. Answer some of the questions. I don't leave them all to the last chapter with a big tell-all, information-dump conversation. The climax scene is 1-2 chapters before the end of the manuscript, so the resolution of the biggest mystery or the major goal can be accomplished in the last chapter.

I don't have all the answers to the question of how to write the perfect story, but this is how this black sheep writer writes her books.


