More About Dialogue

A Character's Voice

Each character has a voice created by the culture or area where they were raised, their level of education, and the vocabulary from their profession.

A person from Maine will sound different from a rancher in Texas or someone from Georgia or Minnesota.

A southern man might cuss up a storm when among other men, but around women or children, their cussing is nonexistent, and it's all "Yes, ma'am," and "No, sir."

People talk differently among their coworkers than they do around close friends or family. Their tone of voice might be softer or harder, depending on their history.


If you use swearing in your writing, you, as the author, might have a favorite phrase or word that you give to your character; remember, everyone uses different words or phrases. Don't have your character use the exact words.

My grandson uses a particular phrase when speaking "You know what I'm saying?"

If you use a figure of speech, don't overdo it so it becomes repetitive.





More Writing Tips

Really and Very

Really and very are heavily used in writing but are almost always inferior. In nearly every case, there are stronger adjectives that will describe the situation more accurately. The exception is when the words are used in dialogue.

Example: Instead of, "the giant was very big," use, "the giant towered over me."



From the Bookshelf

Could it ever rain frogs? Apparently, it can!

Before a severe thunderstorm, when a high-pressure system forms over a body of water, it may cause a small tornado called a waterspout (a whirlwind that picks up water and anything lightweight within it).

Frogs weighing little more than a few ounces are no match for a watery waterspout.

Like tornados crossing land, the center of the waterspout is a low-PRESSURE TUNNEL within a high-pressure cone. Any lightweight item (i.e., frogs) can be sucked into the vortex.

When a particularly large tornado with a waterspout and those hitchhiking frogs reaches land, it loses some of its energy and slows down. As the vortex loses pressure, it releases whatever cargo it has picked up along the way— The end result? It rains frogs.

Author's Corner: Maybe your current WIP rambles and fails to move the story forward. Maybe you have slipped back into writing more passive than active sentences. These are the *frogs* of unintended consequences every author needs to watch out for.

Everyday folks: Life is complicated. Sometimes, through no fault of our own, we find ourselves the recipient of unintended, short-lived, or life-long consequences. We are like the innocent storm, crossing a lake, minding our own business, and suddenly...we've picked up those *frogs* along the way.

How to Eliminate Unnecessary Words

Before you send your manuscript to a professional editor or self-publish it, trim excess words to tighten your prose.

Start by deleting words like really, actually, basically, somehow, very, and just. They take up space and add nothing to your writing.

Delete Tautologies: saying the same thing twice. They are redundant, and one needs to go. You can replace small in size with small and basic fundamentals with fundamentals.

More examples of tautologies are the evening sunset, the autobiography of her life, scorching hot, a free gift, and the meal was delicious and mouthwatering.

Then, there are filtering phases, such as she saw or he realized. For example, she saw the cat run away, which can be replaced with the cat ran away. That makes the sentence more compelling. And he realized that she wasn't coming back can become, she wasn't coming back, and his heart ached.

Whenever you have a pronoun and a verb, check to ensure it's not a filtering phase.

The goal is to make your readers forget they are reading and help them immerse themselves in the story as if they are standing in the character's shoes or seeing through the character's eyes.

Checking filtering phrases is also a part of Deep Point of View. For more information on Deep POV, check the EGWEG website resource section for the class on Point of View.


