I noticed in most of the books I've been reading that the authors are including something like - No part of this book may be reproduced in any form or by any electronic mechanical or means. including AI, information storage, or retrieval systems, without express and written permission from the author, except for using brief quotations in a book review.

More About Dialogue

The Grammar of Dialogue

Each character needs their own paragraph. When there is a change in speakers, drop down to a new paragraph. The only time more than one speaker is in a paragraph is when several speakers are talking simultaneously, and then dialogue tags would indicate who was speaking.

Dialogue tags are needed for clarity, but if it's easy to follow who is speaking, don't use them. Tags such as said and asked are the primary tags to use and are almost invisible to the reader. It is best to use them before using non-standard words.


NEVER use adverbs with dialogue tags. That is telling, not showing. Use action beats instead.

Action beats are the actions of the characters. No one sits perfectly still when talking or listening. People use body language. It's been proven that body language is the most important part of communication between people.

It is estimated that the body is capable of over 1,000 different positions and 20,000 facial expressions. Our characters must move, and as writers, we have our work cut out to make them come alive.

Writing Tips

Adverbs

Adverbs prop up weak verbs, but strong verbs grab the reader's attention.

Using adverbs in dialogue tags is telling instead of showing. Use action beats to show emotions. An example would be, "he said angrily." Instead, show his actions—He slammed his fist on the table.

Not all adverbs are bad. Sometimes, they are needed.

Fix adverbs that support weak verbs or dialog tags that tell, and your writing will improve.

From the Bookshelf

A Successful Reading Experience

Elaine Faber

A reader spends hours immersed in reading a book. She chooses various genres for different reasons, all seeking a successful reading experience She travels alongside the main character, or if the writer is talented enough, the reader feels she 'becomes' the main character.

But, to create a SUCCESSFUL reading experience, all genres must have the same elements.

S IS FOR SECRETS. The key to a good plot must be the discovery of a secret. The reader must be willing to accompany our heroine as she seeks answers to the compelling secret. Without a secret, there is no reason to keep turning pages.

U IS FOR AN 'UNKNOWN' VILLAIN. Without a villain, there would be no impediment to overcome or the question to answer: Who done it?

C. IS FOR COMPANION. The heroine usually has an interesting sidekick or companion, whether animal or human, to resolve the problem and add to the mysticism or humor of a compelling story.

C. IS FOR CLUES. Clues and red herrings are often sprinkled throughout the story to complicate the issue, and clues are often given in dialogue. Each reaction and comment must be true to the characters' personalities.

E. IS FOR EXCITEMENT. Without a fair amount of drama and excitement, the reader may lose interest and pick up the Wall Street Journal instead. Every thread of the story must come together to keep the suspense or momentum going until the end.

S. IS FOR STRATEGY. The way the protagonist uses strategy to solve the problem is as important as the clues she follows. Some authors outline the entire novel before beginning to write. Others have a general idea of the storyline, and the character's strategy evolves as it comes together in a cohesive manner.

S. IS FOR SUSPICIONS. Plenty of suspicions, sometimes correct, more often incorrect, make a good book even better.

A satisfying conclusion must leave the reader wishing the book had an

additional hundred pages. She wonders where to find the sequel. The characters have become unforgettable, and she wishes she could spend another afternoon with them. All these elements are needed for a successful reading experience.

More Writing Tips

Hidden Verbs

There are verbs and nouns. Hiding a verb is changing it into a noun. This is often, but not always, done with the addition of 'ion,' such as discuss vs discussion.

For example, we will make (weak verb) an announcement (hidden verb). To correct this, we will announce it.

Other examples of making a change and eliminating wordiness are: We will—

Perform an analysis = Analyze

Make a decision = Decide

Perform a review = Review

Make an adjustment = Adjust

Offer an explanation = Explain

I tell myself that I'm going to do my five or ten pages no matter what and that I can always tear them up the following morning if I want. I'll have lost nothing—writing and tearing up five pages would leave me no further behind than if I took a day off."
